



HOW DO I INVITE AN INACTIVE CATHOLIC?

Please tear out and follow these 5-steps in giving an inactive Catholic the *We Miss You* brochure.

Step 1: Ask the Lord whom to invite: a family member, relative, co-worker, or friend that is Catholic and inactive in their faith.

Step 2: Write the name of person you are inviting:

(Keep this as a reminder to pray for them.)

Step 3: Begin to pray asking the Holy Spirit for inspiration and to touch their heart and mind.

Step 4: Decide on the best way & time to invite them. A face-to-face conversation is usually best.

Step 5: Extend the invitation and give them the *We Miss You* brochure from your parish. Then be patient, and listen to them in a loving, welcoming and non-judgmental way.

Remember, Jesus says to you, "Do not be afraid..." (Mt. 28:10)

A PRAYER

WE MISS YOU

The full, active, and joyous participation of every Catholic is a precious gift to our faith community. As long as any Catholic is inactive or alienated from the Church, the Church remains incomplete. We want all our inactive brothers and sisters to return to the Church, so we can support each other on our common journey of faith. Here are some reflections on that journey that you may find helpful.

GROWING SPIRITUALLY

God wants you to make the greatest possible difference with the rest of your life. Many people are realizing that the routines and rhythms of their everyday life do not fulfill their hunger for purpose and meaning—they are restless to live a life that matters. This restlessness in itself is a first step to growing spiritually. Faith is a gift from God that strengthens our spiritual life and inspires us to live as disciples of Jesus Christ. But growing spiritually has to be practical. It's about finding real Gospel answers to the real needs and real questions of real people.

Maybe your life is full—but it's not fulfilling. You see, our pursuit of personal fulfillment and significance goes far beyond material or emotional success. We were created for loving relationships. We need God, and we need each other. The Lord Jesus said, "I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." (John 10:10) To grow in the abundant life that Christ promised to all of us, means that we need to find a community of faith and enter into a fruitful relationship with others in the Church.

It doesn't matter how long someone has been away from the practice of the faith. The return of an inactive Catholic at any time brings great joy to God and enriches the life of the Church. Through God's grace, the person returning can develop a deeper and stronger faith.

CATCHING UP

The Catholic faith is a rich treasury of teachings and tradition. Even the most learned among us does not know everything. Lifelong Catholics continue to read, study, and attend adult faith formation classes to grow in their faith. Anyone who wants to "catch up" will be right at home with other Catholics.
